## Description

The future: the only constant is change. The only certainty is uncertainty. So how do you prepare today for what might come tomorrow? In this upper-level, interdisciplinary course unique to Excelsior College, you will learn through questions, not answers. You'll challenge your prior assumptions, open your mind, and consider society's future dilemmas, progress, and crises. You'll plan and question your own future—your educational path, career trajectories, personal interests, ambitions, and mindsets. And you'll hone the skills and flexibility of mind—research and writing, critical thinking, metacognition, intellectual curiosity, and self-regulation—to help you navigate the uncertainty and change of our future societies, workplaces, and selves.

**Note:** This course must be completed with a grade of C or higher. Registration in this course is restricted to incoming students with 60 or more transfer credits. This course duplicates IND101 and CCS120. Credit for only one of these courses will be applied toward graduation. The Cornerstone cannot be completed in the same term as a Capstone course.

## Outcomes

### Criteria

#### Required Course Activities:

Before beginning your course work, be sure to review the Excelsior College Guidelines for Online Interaction (a.k.a. Online Etiquette or "Netiquette"). If you have any questions regarding these guidelines, please feel free to direct them to your instructor.

#### ***Discussions 20%***

You are required in each module to complete one discussion question outside of the webtext of **two paragraphs or more**, that clearly answers the question prompt, shows understanding of the course content, and relies on evidence to support your points. After you have posted your response, comment on **at least two postings from others**. Your initial post must be completed by

**Thursday** evening of each module. Your response to other classmates' work must be complete by **Sunday** evening of the module. In Modules 6 and 8, the initial posts will be in the form of video or audio posts. Instructions on how to complete this discussion are located in the course.

Consult the Discussion Expectations for information about writing your discussion posts. It is recommended that you write your post in a document first. Check your work and correct any spelling or grammatical errors. When you are ready to make your initial post, click on "Reply." Then copy/paste the text into the message field, and click "Post Reply."

When posting your discussion responses, it is important that you be both honest and respectful of the ideas and comments of your fellow students. You should remember that the discussion postings take place in an open forum. Please refrain from vulgar, racial, or sexist remarks or comments that might be considered offensive

**This course uses "post first" discussion forums. You must submit your initial post before you can view other students' posts.**

#### ***Webtext work – 25%***

Each week you will complete one chapter of the required SOOMO webtext. The chapter includes multiple choice questions, polls, response boards, and short answers to check your ability to understand and apply the concepts from the reading and viewing materials. Multiple choice questions can be reset once if your answer was incorrect the first time.

As you complete the questions, your score will sync back to the Canvas grade center. Make sure to complete the assigned webtext work within the module in which it is due. Work completed on the Monday and Tuesday after the module has closed are eligible for up to 80% of the original credit. After that point, late work in the webtext can be completed only at the discretion of your instructor.

#### ***Milestones (x6) – 30%***

Each week in Modules 1-6, you will complete a Milestone assignment on a research and writing skill that builds toward the Final Project, due in Module 7. Each Milestone assignment is worth 5% of your overall course grade and will be evaluated according to a unique rubric. The Milestones include:

- Milestone 1: Starting Your Research
- Milestone 2: Brainstorming and Finding Sources
- Milestone 3: Thesis Statement Draft and Annotated Bibliography
- Milestone 4: Paraphrasing and List of References
- Milestone 5: Introduction and Outline
- Milestone 6: Peer Review

#### ***Final Project – 20%***

At the end of Module 7 you will submit your Final Project, a research paper of 6-7 pages (approx. 1500-1750 words) that uses at least 4 references and builds on your Milestone work in Modules 1-6. The Final Project is worth 20% of your overall course grade and will be evaluated according to the IND101 Final Project rubric.

#### ***Action Plan – 5%***

In Module 8, you will think about your academic and career future to create two long-term goals and an action plan to achieve them.

## INSTRUCTOR PARTICIPATION

Your instructor will:

- Post a welcome message during the first 24 hours of the course.

- All subsequent late assignments may be assessed a late penalty of 5 percent per day, starting on day one. There will be no 5-day grace period.
